Towards a Political Ecology of Earth System Science

Historical Epistemologies of Planetary Modelling (HEPM) is an ongoing project between the Centre of Excellence for Anthropocene History at KTH, Stockholm and the Max Planck Institute for the History of Science Berlin, that works to advance recent critical histories of Earth System Science (ESS), the computational and model-derived analysis of the planet as a parametrized system of feedbacks. Moving beyond historical epistemology, HEPM II will begin to address the political ecology of ESS.

Political ecology focuses on the material and political conditions that mediate between society and the environment. In contrast to ecology, it concerns conflicts, power, and the uneven distribution of environmental costs and benefits. It draws out the politics of environmental problems and understands them as outcomes of specific social, historical and geographical contexts.

The workshop addresses ESS's relation to specific knowledge regimes, and forms of state institutional and corporate power. It will also explore the material and energetic demands of its technologies and their consequences.

Moreover, we will ask, in a constructive register, what would a more radical kind of planetary modelling look like? And, as part of this, we will ask, if and how underrepresented, marginalized, and critical perspectives can be integrated into ESS?
